December Highlights

The gull roost produced some notable records with 1000 Herring Gulls and 200 Greater Black Backed Gulls on the 1st, sightings of Caspian Gulls on 1st, 3rd, and 11th and a Yellow Legged Gull was also recorded on the 11th.

A fly-past of 74 **Pink Footed Geese** was noted on the 2nd, with up to 3 birds being seen amongst the **Greylag Geese** from the 26th onwards. On the 3rd, 2 **Egyptian Geese** were also noted. **Gadwalls, Goldeneyes, Teals, Tufted Ducks, Mallards** and **Pochards** were seen throughout the month. There were regular sightings of **Shellduck, Mandarin Duck** and **Goosander**, with 3 **Wigeon** being present on the 3rd. **Water Rail** sightings were noted on the 15th, 23rd, 24th and 26th and **Little Egrets** were present on the 11th and 23rd.

Redshank sightings were recorded on the 1st and 2nd of the month, 325 **Lapwings** on the 21st and 205 on the 11th, a **Dunlin** also on the 2nd, and **Snipe** on the 11th, 17th and 29th. **Linnets, Redpolls, Meadow Pipets, Fieldfares, Redwings, Bullfinches, Willow Tits**, a **Pied Wagtail** and a **Brambling** were also seen.

January Highlights

Whooper Swans (3) visited on the 15th. Throughout January, on occasions 3 or 4 Pinkfooted Geese could be found amongst the Greylag Geese around the reservoir and on 6th large numbers were seen (900) flying past. Teal (up to 210), Gadwall (1-13), Tufted Ducks (0-13) and Goldeneye (0-5) were ubiquitously present, or almost so, throughout the month. Less ubiquitous were Great Crested Grebes (0-6) and Goosander (0-9); with the odd Pochard (on the 1st), Shelduck (2nd and 13th), Pintail (30th), a few Wigeon (8th, 10th and 11th), 16 Mandarin Ducks (14th), Little Grebes (3rd, 10th, 11th, 15th); and a Water Rail being seen on several occasions.

Good numbers of **Lapwing** were recorded throughout January, the most (nearly 600) being counted on the 30th. **Dunlin** were recorded on the 9th and 10th, a **Woodcock** on the 3rd, **Snipe** on the 1st and 10th, with 50 birds being seen on the 13th.

Grey Partridges (4) were seen within the recording area on the 19th, whilst Ravens, flocks of Fieldfares and Redwings, Dipper, Willow Tit, Grey Wagtail, Tree Sparrow, Yellowhammer, Brambling, Siskin, Chaffinch, Greenfinch and Common Redpoll were all noted.

The gull roost also produced some notable records with 2500 Herring Gulls and 910 Greater Black Backed Gulls on the 5th; 2070 Herring Gulls, a Yellow Legged Gull, 1080 Greater Black Backed Gulls, 26 Lesser Back Backed Gulls, 19 Common Gulls and 2000 Black Headed Gulls on the 17th of the month. Yellow Legged Gulls were also seen on the 12th and 18th; and Iceland Gulls on the 7th, 10th and 29th.

February Highlights

A Glaucous Gull was present in the gull roost on the 2nd February, whilst Herring Gulls, Greater Black Backed Gulls, Lesser Black Backed Gulls and 1000 Black Headed Gulls were noted on the 6th. Common Gulls were also noted on the 13th, 14th, 22nd, 24th and 20 on the 25th (along with 500 Herring Gulls, a Yellow Legged Gull, 50 Greater Black Backed Gulls, 100 Lesser Black Backed Gulls and 2000 Black Headed Gulls).

Mute swans were seen on the 4th and 8th, as was possibly "a" **Pink-Footed Goose** on occasions throughout the month. On the 4th, 196 **Pink-Footed Geese** flew over, as did a flock of 9 **Barnacle Geese** on the 10th. **Shellducks** were seen on a number of occasions, as were **Wigeon**, **Mandarin Ducks** and **Little Grebes**. More frequent visitors, in generally variable abundance depending on the species, were **Tufted Ducks**, **Teal**, **Gadwall**, **Goldeneye**, **Goosander** and **Great Crested Grebes**. A **Water Rail** was also seen on the 17th. Throughout late January and February **Grey Herons** started to occupy nests in the heronry with 2-3 birds on 22nd Jan, 7 nests inhabited on the 4th Feb and 14 occupied nests counted on the 10th March.

Lapwings (up 400) were counted on regular occasions, as were **Oystercatchers** (up to 4). A **Knot**, several **Snipe**, a **Ringed Plover**, a fly-past of 18 **Golden Plover** and a **Curlew**, were also seen throughout the month.

Of the Passerines: up to 80 linnets were present throughout the month; the odd flock of Fieldfares and Redwings; 3 Song Thrushes on the 6th; Willow Tits and Grey Wagtails were fairly frequent visitors; a Yellowhammer on the 18th and a Common Crossbill on the 21st; occasional Common Redpoll with a small flock on the 23rd; and small flocks of Lesser Redpolls were seen on the 21st and 22nd.

March Highlights

Mute Swans were present on the 2nd, 3rd, 28th and 29th of March and 35 Whooper Swans were seen on the 19th. A Pink-footed Goose was seen on the 28th, Pintails were seen on several occasions, a Pochard on the 12th and small numbers of Wigeon were present on 4 days, 3 of these consecutive. More frequent sightings of Tufted Duck, Gadwall, Teal, Goldeneye, Goosander and Great Crested Grebe were also recorded. Carrying on from February a wave of Mandarin Ducks passed through, with up to 29 birds being counted in the middle part of the month, also continuing into April. There were also occasional sightings of Little Grebes and Water Rail.

During the cold spell at the beginning of the month, a rapid decline of the **Lapwing** population around the reservoir was noted (272 on 25th Feb to 6 on the 3rd March). The population then recovered again partially (e.g. 96 on the 9th) before declining again, presumably as birds moved away to establish breeding territories in suitable locations. Numbers of **Oystercatchers, Snipe** and **Curlews** passed through; 6 **Woodcock** were seen on the 7th and a single bird on the 22nd; a **Black Tailed Godwit** was seen on the 10th; also on the 10th, 19 **Golden Plover**; a **Redshank** on the 15th and a **Dunlin** on the 16th; and single **Little Ringed Plovers** were seen on the 16th, 25th and 31st

A **Nordic Jackdaw** was noted on the 9th, **Redwings** and **Fieldfares** were still seen throughout March, **Willow Tits** were seen often and **Skylarks** continued to pass through. Summer visitors started to arrive, the first **Sand Martin** and **Chiffchaffs** being recorded on the 13th. **Meadow Pipits** were seen on the 2nd, 18th and 26th with a **Rock Pipit** being listed on the 17th. Good numbers of **Linnets** were still noted but fewer sightings of **Common Redpoll** and fewer still of **Lesser Redpoll**. **Hawfinches** (4) were noted on the 13th and odd birds were seen on the 11th, 21st and 23rd.

Amongst the gulls on the 22nd were 418 Herring Gulls, 160 Greater Black Backed Gulls, 113 Lesser Black Backed Gulls, 16 Common Gulls and 750 Black Headed Gulls. Common Gull numbers fluctuated throughout March; also single records of some other species were also noted through the month (a Yellow Legged Gull on the 2nd, an Iceland Gull on the 11th and 2 on the 28th, a Little Gull on the 5th and a Kittiwake on the 13th.

This is typical of Pollyanna's unstinting kindness.

An Archive of Ogston's Data and Records available to All

Old Annual Reports

It was only when I got my hands upon a full set of Ogston's Annual Reports (courtesy of Phil Shooter who, as one of the Club's founder members, played an enormous part in the early years of the club and who was its first Chairman), that it occurred to me how rare these documents were likely to be and what a valuable resource they would be to those interested in club history and/or wanting to research occurrences of specific species of bird/s that had been recorded on site in the past. The first Annual Report was produced in 1969 on what is now an unfamiliar size of cheap paper. It was typed and then reproduced by what I guess was a kind of Offset Litho process resulting in a very variable product. Since then one has been printed annually (except 2015, which was combined with the 2016 report). If only they could be digitised I thought, and made freely available for posterity!

Bird Records

Bill Padley and I began editing and assembling the Annual Report beginning with the 2015-16 report. Conscious of the fact that not all club members were expert birders, we adopted a different approach to previous editions in an attempt to create something that we hoped the majority would find more readable. To do this, we dispensed with a lot of the detail on bird sightings and replaced it with more of an overview and with, where appropriate, an interpretation of the data and the inclusion of graphs and tables. The down side of this approach is that for some members, vital detail was missing. In contrast, Bill and I had access to the detailed website records for a whole year which we had stored in an Excel Spreadsheet enabling us to create graphs/tables which we could incorporate within the report. It thus seemed that if we could make this spreadsheet available to members and make the Annual Report more readable (hopefully), all needs would be catered for.

After consulting Nikki Mahadevan, our website guru, the committee agreed that old Annual Reports could be made available on the Internet. In addition, the spreadsheets for all OBC's website bird records would be made available in the same way (see example below of this type of data).


Work Parties



Health and Safety at work, removing the old roof; working from inside the hide. Mind you is Mr Left trying to take over Mr Right's stepladder?


